Phyllis Erlich: Multi medium, acrylic on canvas, with quilting material and photographs, pen and ink. 20x20. I truly love it now, whereas before it was okay but without much personality. Necessity was surely the Mother of invention and welcoming, for me, and the viewers of, "Honey, I'm Home!"



From Sheila Firestone: During the Pandemic, I wrote my first piece of music using twelve tone technique in combination with traditional tonal music. Because of the chaos of the time and the frantic search for cures as well as the political problems of inequity that began to surface, this modern dance piece for violin and piano, "Pandemic 8'46" was born.

I was excited by the emerging melodies as I began using this technique. Thus, I began work on a suite of seven short pieces to be shared during the "Counting of the Omer," which I call "Restoring Balance. I use a different compositional row to represent each of the seven weeks of the counting. This work is a forty-nine-day journey for personal growth using two different voice groups weekly and the accompanying piano. This year's counting begins on Sunday March 28, 2021. The journey begins on the second night of Passover to the day before Shavuot marking the Giving of the Torah at Mt. Sinai. I have engaged "Choral Voices" to record the movements. I plan to have the work complete before Mach 28, which coincidentally, is my older son's birthday.

Fran Goodman, Co-Chair Art) will be presenting a program to the Ft. Lauderdale branch of NLAPW. **Phyllis Erlich**, Co-Chair Art, will be attending that presentation, on February 11, 2021. Using PowerPoint to tell her story, Fran will take you down her winding road to become an abstract expressionist, sharing why the concept of "make over" is inherent in everything she did and still does. Along with receiving recognition for her paintings, Fran has been featured on national television, women magazines and in the *New York Times*.

Vera Ripp Hirschhorn: February is Black History Month, and I was inspired to write briefly about the African American suffragists. Before the Civil War, **Sojourner Truth**, a former slave, became an advocate for abolition and women's rights. In 1866, the Black poet, novelist, Frances Ellen Watkins Harper, said, "we are all bound up together in one great bundle of humanity." Although Ida B. Wells, a Black journalist and civil rights leader, was not invited to join a national parade with the White Illinois delegation, she did anyway. Afterwards, she founded the first African American women's suffrage group in Chicago.

Ida B. Wells and Mary C. Terrell were founders of the National Association of Colored Women and the NAACP. While they helped White women pass the nineteenth amendment in 1920, they weren't eligible to vote. Sadly, poll taxes, literacy tests, and grandfather clauses prevented them.

According to Black historian Martha Jones, the amendment "marked for African American women a start, not a finish for suffrage." "It fueled a new chapter in the struggle for voting rights in the United States, a movement that Black women led all the way to 1965 with the passage of the Voting Rights Act."

Marlene Klotz dashed off this poem the other night when she grew nostalgic about how nice it was to enjoy dinner at any one of the restaurants in town without the worries we now live with. Ah, so much for wishful thinking!


